## 9:40-10:10 Vocabulary and Conversation



Ah, shopping! – Whether a **necessary evil**, a personal **delight**, or a common activity, shopping is part of all our lives. And people can shop at many different kinds of stores. There are stores that sell specific products: like a shoe store, a **mattress** store, or a **butcher** shop. But there are also stores that sell many products – a **department** store or a grocery store. If you want to buy a large quantity, you could go to a **wholesale** store, like Costco or Sam's Club. Or if you want to buy products that have already been used, you could go to a **resale** store or a used-furniture store. So much shopping, so little time!

### Vocabulary

- **Necessary evil** – something that is not good but required, you have to do it
- **Delight** – something that makes you happy
- **Mattress** – something people sleep on, usually on a bed
- **Butcher** – a person who prepares meat
- **Department** – a part of something that has been divided; example: a company has many parts or *departments*
- **Wholesale** – selling goods in large quantities, often at reduced cost
- **Resale** – selling things that have already been used

### Conversation – practice this conversation at least twice

Trudy: Hi Lisa! Do you have any plans for the weekend?

Lisa: Oh hello, Trudy. Well, my kids have soccer practice on Saturday morning. And I also need to do some shopping.

Trudy: Me too. What kind of shopping?

Trudy: I like to go to a mall to do shopping. Then if one store doesn't have what I need, I can visit another store very easily.

Trudy: Oh – Woodfield Mall in Schaumburg. It's huge!

Lisa: That's a great mall. Did you need to do some shopping too?

Trudy: Yes, I'm going to the grocery store on Saturday. We need to buy some chicken, fruit and vegetables. And we are out of bread.

Lisa: Where do you go grocery shopping?

Trudy: At Jewel – it's near my house. It's very convenient.

Lisa: Well, I hope you find some sales. Happy Shopping!

Verb + Infinitive	
<p>Karen offered <i>to buy</i> me some milk          My sister needs <i>to get</i> some new shows</p>	<p>Some verbs are followed by an infinitive.          Infinitive = <b>to</b> + <i>the simple form of a verb</i></p>
<p>I've decided <i>not to go</i> to the mall this Saturday.</p>	<p>Negative form = <b>not</b> + <i>infinitive</i></p>
<p><b>Common verbs <i>followed by an infinitive</i> often used for SHOPPING:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Want</li> <li>• Need</li> <li>• Would like</li> <li>• Would love</li> <li>• Hope</li> <li>• Expect</li> <li>• Intend</li> <li>• Plan</li> </ul>	<p><b>Common infinitive verbs used for SHOPPING</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• To buy</li> <li>• To purchase</li> <li>• To get</li> <li>• To find</li> </ul> <p><b><i>Examples:</i></b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• He plans <i>to buy</i> a new car.</li> <li>• I would like <i>to purchase</i> a new coat.</li> <li>• Linda needs <i>to get</i> a ruler for her son.</li> </ul>
