The simple past tense and the present perfect tense are very similar in how they are formed, but they carry slightly different meanings

FORM SIMPLE PAST	With the simple past, the simple verb is used. The present perfect on the other hand uses

Example:

Statement: I have cheered for the Bulls for many years. **Answer:** Unspecified time, so it is a present perfect.
